#### Review of Last Session – lots of apologies last time, so a review might be useful

- Reminder of the key sentence/universal themes underpinning memoir.... 'A Song for Mary not just a tale of 'immigrant life\*', but a universal story of 'a mother's love for her child\*' and 'a child's determination to do his mother proud\*'' (\*universal themes)
- Stories 'Changing my mind' and 'I quit'; also Graeme's 'Car Stories'
- Editing challenges/discussion
  - Numbers under 10 Numbers under and over 10 generally spell out numbers under 10 unless it is followed by a precise unit of measurement eg. 7 years old. Good reference - <u>https://www.scribbr.com/academic-writing/numbers/</u>
  - Swearing eg. 'Oh Shit!', ' made a real ball's up'... NB context, 'artistic freedom',
  - Using Thesaurus related to 'shocked' <u>https://www.powerthesaurus.org/shocked/synonyms</u>
  - Exceptions to old rules... beginning sentences with 'And...' (when in doubt don't?); <u>Kids vs children ... ?</u> (kids or children is 'about connection, not perfection'.... .... It means looking at the setting..., the people speaking, etc)

### Memoir Review/s?

Framework for a short 'report' ... Share five things

- Title/subtitle/
- Author/
- Subtitle/'lens' or focus/
- Universal themes such as 'Career loss'; 'midlife crisis'; 'motherhood/fatherhood'; 'grief'; etc
- Highlight how it related to something in/about your life; etc.

#### Handout new guidelines sheet for both short/oral and longer/written memoir reviews.

#### **Reminiscence icebreaker** -

Talk about a craft or hobby or other interest that was important to you as a child and perhaps recurred in some form throughout your life.... How did you get interested, absorbed in it, who inspired/helped you.... With what results? Has it recurred, perhaps in other interests, over time?

<u>'True Confessions'</u> - (Life Matters 500 Words 2021) "Tell us about a time when you fessed up to someone, or someone fessed up to you...or when you heard the truth from someone who'd been keeping it to themselves... What happened when the truth was revealed? It can be funny or sad or quirky or powerful, it just needs to be true, and it needs to be your story to tell. You can of course change names to protect people."... "It could be with yourself, or within your family, but please change names if you need to."

# Coming up on August 21

**Topic 1 'Retirement'** Retirement is a transition which can be quite complex, involve a range of losses, may be dreaded, involve celebrations and be looked forward to, indeed all of the above! ... Share the story of your retirement from a role which was important to you at some stage of your life – how did you negotiate it? How did you feel about the transition at the time? **'An item of clothing which symbolizes a time in my life...'** (Suggestion from Graham Jensen for 2023) Write a story about an item of clothing you still have (or have a photo of) which symbolizes a time or event in your life. Tell the story surrounding the clothing, the context in which it appeared in your life, significant moments which occurred while wearing it, what it means to you, why you find it hard to let go. Try to bring along the item of clothing, or a photo of it, if you can!
