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President's Report

What a wonderful day we had at Enrolment Day on Wednesday 10 January! There seemed to be a continuous stream of people coming through the door to chat with the Convenors and then to fill in an Enrolment Form.

My thanks to all the Convenors who came and talked to those new to U3A Benalla, and also to our current members. It was great that you told them about the successful courses that you all run, and gave them the Information the prospective members were seeking. Thank you.

My thanks also to the Committee members, and others, who came early and helped set up the tables and chairs. That was an essential ingredient for the success of the morning.

Since then, enrolments have been steadily coming in. The first morning we opened the U3A Benalla Office on Wednesday 17 January we had another twelve enrolments. Opening the office has also provided the opportunity for members to suggest courses of interest, which is important information for us to work on.

The U3A Office will open each Wednesday morning from 10am to 12 noon until the end of February. So, if you have not enrolled yet, please come and bring your Enrolment form one Wednesday morning soon.

Alternatively, there is still the option for enrolment using on-line banking, enrolment by post and also for leaving the form and money in an envelope at the Redb4 Bookshop in Bridge Street.

To date we have received 338 Membership forms for our 46 courses. The numbers for some courses are very impressive: Garden Appreciation 78, Exercises for Fun 77 and Wine Appreciation 49. Patchwork has attracted 32 participants this year, and Music Appreciation 30. The consistency of these excellent numbers particularly for Patchwork and Craft and also for Music Appreciation shows the need for a larger room to be available to U3A Benalla, and the Committee will be continuing to ask Benalla Rural City Council for a larger room in 2024.

Some courses such as Ukulele and Community Singing have commenced during the second half of January. However, the majority of our programs are commencing in February.

The proposed name change of the building where we meet from the Benalla Senior Citizens Community Centre to the Benalla Seniors and Community Centre was suggested jointly in a letter by U3A Benalla and the Senior Citizens to the Benalla Rural City Council. This name change will make all people who use the building feel included.

Currently there is a survey being conducted by the Benalla Rural City Council to find out if the public is happy with the name change.

There are two ways in which you as members of U3A Benalla can show support for this name change. Firstly, there are forms just inside the side entrance of the building (the entrance we use) which can be filled in and handed into Customer Service by Friday 16 February 2024. We would appreciate as many U3A Benalla members as possible filling in this survey so that the name change is adopted by the Benalla Rural City Council.

Art Appreciation

Our 'First Mondays' session at the Art Gallery on December 4 was a most enjoyable morning.



We were lucky to meet an artist with two works of art completed recently at the request of the Gallery. Mark Dober has painted what you could call a portrait of Winton Wetlands in gouache and watercolours. He has produced two exceptional paintings full of interest and detail. These are large paintings in which Mark has endeavoured to give an impression of Winton and in effect capture the essence of the land. He has tried hard to get the colours and idea of the area as he sees it and we admire him for this.

Mark also showed us examples of his other work on landscapes in various parts of Victoria. These are more detailed than his portraits of Winton. We have to note that his portrait of Winton was done in en plein air as quickly as possible and the other works he showed were done in the studio after some reflection and re organisation of the landscape. More orthodox works of art but nevertheless giving a good comparison between the two styles.

The 'Mark Dober: Wetlands' exhibition, which runs until the 18th February, is well worth looking at.

Coming up at 'First Mondays' on the 5th February 2024 at 10 am, artist Chris O'Brien will be in conversation with an Arts Project Australia staff artist, coinciding with his exhibition *Oh, the places I've seen!* Meet other members after the session over coffee at the Gallery's Munro and Sargent Cafe.

Australian Shares & Stock Market

From Kenny Rogers singing 'The Gambler' to Les Rogers' presentation on 'The History of Batteries'!

Our December meeting opened to the tune of Kenny Rogers' video singing "The Gambler"

"You'd better count your money When you're sittin' at the table There'll time enough for countin' When the deal is done"!

The month of December has again not been good, with very few rises and a lot of red on our selections sheet. While Lithium has been centre of our discussions for many months, I hope 2024 we can look across all eleven sectors in detail. Our Bendigo Invest Direct Watchlist for the 11 months is negative 12%. This is reflected in the market overall.

Les put together the history of batteries from the lead acid to Nickel Cadmium to Lithium types in a very good Power Point presentation. Lithium will remain the best storage solution in the near future although there are several other types being developed but technical problems are impediments.

Les received a jar of Vegemite for his assistance during the year and today's presentation.

Our long-term stock winner was Margaret J with her XRF selection that gained 28% for the year and the customary home-made jar of jam was handed out. Margaret W came a close second with her selection of NXT that gained 26%. Well done.

Afternoon tea was a long break during which we enjoyed a slice of fruit cake from the local supermarket.

After the break we looked at the implication of the dramatic fall in Lithium prices and the importance of the cost of production. Investors who take note of the Short Sellers list were forewarned of the downturn in lithium companies. We then viewed the eight companies who gained over 50% in the ASX200 and the two companies who lost 50%.

The volatility of the market of the past 12 months was evident in the charts of CBA and BHP.

The final results of our selection charts demonstrated a difficult year for stock pickers.

Our short-term stock winner was Neville with his selection of IND (INDUSTRIAL MINERALS LTD) that rose with profit of \$9,105. Neville also received a jar of jam.

Our December meeting was our last as the 'Investment' group - the first meeting of our newly badged 'Australian Shares and Stock Market' group will be Monday 5th February 2024. It is the last report cowritten by co-convenor, John Hanlon, who decided to retire at the end of 2023. As group member and previous Investment convenor Margaret Jenkins wrote in her President's message in January 'Thank you, John for your thoughtful and helpful sessions throughout 2023. The wisdom in what you presented was enjoyed by all members of the group.'



Exploring the Universe

From Galileo to the James Webb Space Telescope

In the last 300 years our knowledge of Astronomy has come a long way. Up to the early 17th century the night sky could only be observed with the naked eye. Thus, Astronomy was only concerned with the position and measurements of heavenly bodies. In the spring of 1609 Italian Astronomer Galileo Galilei heard that Dutch spectacle maker Hans Lipperhey had invented an instrument that magnified distant objects by 3 times. Galileo made his own 3 powered spyglass from spectacle lenses. Teaching himself the art of lens grinding he produced telescopes magnifying up to 20 times. He saw more stars and celestial objects than ever before!

In December 1609 Galileo studied the moon's phases and drew pictures of a moon with a surprisingly rough surface. In January 1610 he made the amazing discovery of 4 moons orbiting Jupiter. It wasn't a wandering star, it was a planet.



Galileo also observed and documented the phases of Venus and his discoveries proved Copernicus's theory that the Earth and other planets revolved around the Sun. He made so many important astronomical discoveries and mathematical calculations that he is called the Father of Observational Astronomy and Modern Physics.

Astronomy advanced with the invention of the telescope. By the late 19th century thousands of photographic plates had been created that could be studied by astronomers.

The different types of light, the electromagnetic spectrum, opened up a new field of study.

The first astronomical use of spectroscopy was analyses of sunlight. Every natural element in the universe has a characteristic fingerprint of light that can tell us the properties of stars, planets, supernovae and interstellar gasses, their mass, temperature, and distance.

In 1923 Edwin Hubble determined that our Milky Way was not the only galaxy in the universe. By measuring the distance of stars in what was thought to be the Andromeda Nebula he discovered that it was actually a far galaxy. Cosmology was alive and well.

A telescope is like a time machine. The images from The Hubble Space Telescope brought the cosmos to us all. The James Webb with its technology and huge mirrors looks further back than the great Hubble Telescope and with the two working together we can expect more great discoveries of the early universe.

What would Galileo Galilei think of the James Webb Space Telescope? Of a telescope using infrared vision that can detect objects in space that we humans are not capable of seeing and has allowed us to peer back 13.5 billion years in time.

This is an exciting time to be 'Exploring the Universe'.

Our speaker in December was *Bruce Cowan*, a Benalla based glider pilot, who spoke about early pilots and attempts to make heavier than air machines stay airborne.

Bruce started with early optimists who flung themselves off high towers with minimal winged attachments and often fatal results. Then he progressed with more successful kite and glider pilots, who were often successful in Germany; then later with the Wright brothers and their dubiously acknowledged success, as the first successful powered aeroplane pilots with their Wright flyer.

On Tuesday 6 February at 2pm, local model aircraft builder *Roly Gaumann*, will talk about and later show us examples of his life

work of building and often competitively flying model aeroplanes.

Stock and Land

In early December we joined with the Sustainability group to look at the work of Gretals Australia Pty Ltd's work in commercialising the pharmaceutical benefits of certain types of eucalyptus leaves.

Chairman, MD and CEO of Gretals, Alistair Cumming, initially showed us their eucalyptus leaf processing plant in Benalla, before taking us to Gretals' farm at Lurg. There the company is assessing various irrigated eucalyptus lines, with the aim of discovering leaves which produce compounds applicable to human cognitive and respiratory health, neuro degenerative diseases, animal health applications and substances which might counter antibiotic resistance.



The company has already discovered promising species and aims in a few years to list on the New York stock exchange.

At 10 am on Tuesday February 6, our speaker will be *Rodney Cook*, a fifth-generation beef, sheep and cropping farmer from Baddagginie.



Remembering ... Brian Howard, Keith Rogers and Stella Wharton

The past few months have seen the passing of three U3A members who played an important part in the life of U3A for over a decade and for whom U3A was a much-loved part of life.

A member of U3A Benalla from 2007 to 2022, **Brian Howard** was for many years John Lloyd's backup convenor for the Sustainability group, convening the group and providing interesting material for discussion when John was travelling or had other commitments. A retired engineer and accomplished tool maker, Brian was also a member of the Tech Talks group. Brian presented models he had built to demonstrate the principles of solar thermal power to both groups, boiling a kettle of water in the process. Brian's story 'My Other Life', a favourite in our 'As Time Goes By' collection, relates to his passion for working with wood.

Particularly well known in Benalla as a former Principal of Benalla High School, an involvement written extensively about elsewhere, *Keith Rogers* was a member of U3A Benalla from 2013 to 2023. A lover of fine wines and the theatre arts, Keith was for many years a co-convenor of U3A Benalla's Wine Appreciation group with his wife Heather and Noel Meagher. When the Play Reading group commenced in 2016, Keith, a local thespian, was asked whether he would like to be involved. Keith became the group's 'creative director', selecting plays and encouraging class members until he became unwell.

Stella Wharton passed away at Cooinda on Monday 29 January. An active member of U3A Benalla from 2012 to 2023, her son Ian said that Stella had enjoyed her time with U3A and asked us to inform our members of her passing. Memories of Stella include her letting us know that her family would like to donate a collection of recorders of different sizes and tones to our new Recorder group in 2018, a gift described as 'truly wonderful' by convenor Janet Douglas.
