## **2022 Annual President's Report**



"My five years as President has seen in the first year the move from W4 to one room at the Seniors Community Building which has now become two rooms and an office.

The continued growth of Benalla U3A is a testament to the members and the wonderful people who step forward and offer their expertise to run a Program, and the many convenors who have been leading classes for many years.

Benalla's close contact with the U3A Network has seen us run many regional meetings over the past five years. We have been complimented on our ability to run successful and professional Regional meetings. These get-togethers help all U3A's in sharing ideas particularly types of activities on offer. We at Benalla are envied for our membership numbers and are often asked how we advertise for members.

The main source of our new members is our wonderful website. My thanks go to Bev Lee who has developed and run this informative website for the past eight years. Bev spends many hours on this and other U3A Benalla activities and she has done a wonderful job.

Currently our membership stands at 306 members. This includes 34 people have joined U3A Benalla for the first time this year. We also have 4 Life Memberships.

I would like to sincerely thank our wonderful Convenors who run U3A Benalla's 44 programs. The variety of programs we offer is incredible. From outdoor activities such as Bird watching, Garden Appreciation and Easy Walks, so social activities such as Meet and Mingle and Chat'n'chew, to programs such as Politics, Tech Savvy Programs for both Apple iPads and Android Tablets, Music Appreciation, Art Appreciation Recorder, Patchwork and Singing Groups. There are many more programs which I haven't mentioned, but all are valued and appreciated. Without our Convenors there would be no programs, so thank you to all Convenors for the time and effort they spend organising, helping and running each and every group.

At this point I would like to acknowledge the marvellous work by the Convenors of two Groups who retired at the end of 2021. Firstly, to John Lloyd who started and ran the Sustainability Group for 13 years. John's continued interest and extensive reading on environmental issues set the scene for each fortnightly session. He arrived at each class with evidence-based articles from reputable writers to photocopy, distribute and discuss with class members. During the Pandemic, John distributed these articles on-line to members before sessions, some of which he facilitated using 'Zoom'. John has retired because he and Freida are in the process of selling their home at Chesney Vale and moving to the Castlemaine/Bendigo district.

The second Group to have a retiring Convenor is the very popular Wine Appreciation Group. Keith and Heather Rogers together with the late Noel Meagher ran this group together since 2013. For the last three years Keith and Heather have run the Wine Appreciation Group by themselves. Their interest in the topic has seen them regularly doing a "pre-Wine Appreciation" tour to include not only the Winery that was about to be visited, but also the establishment chosen for the lunch to follow. Thank you for your enthusiasm and for all those memorable Wineries and lunch venues the Group has visited.

In this past year we are grateful to the Benalla Rural City Council for allocating us a second room. Our timetable is full for our first U3A room, and this second room is allowing smaller groups such as Family Research--Beginners and Russian Literature to have a slot on the timetable. The technology we have installed in this second room has been paid for by Grants we have accessed from Be Connected or the Good Things Foundation, which is supported by the Federal Government.

In 2021 we applied for a Benalla Rural City Grant for a projector to be installed in this main Auditorium. In our application we told the Council that it could also benefit the Senior Citizens who share this building with us. We received the Grant. Then Council officers found more money and said the BRCC would undertake the installation of the Projector project and be totally responsible for maintenance of the equipment. This happened six months ago, and due to COVID we are still waiting for the projector to be installed in this Auditorium.

In October 2021 we celebrated Get On-Line Week with a COVID safe lunch on the veranda outside this Auditorium. It was a delightful sunny day, and we discovered this new area of this building which is extremely suitable for gatherings of about 30 people.

In late February 2022 we held a Convenors afternoon which was well attended. The purpose of this meeting was to hear how Convenors were starting in 2022, and to share with Convenors our use of Drop Box for accessing Class lists and Email addresses of Course participants. This two-way conversation proved beneficial to both Convenors the Committee.

Finally, I would like to thank the U3A Benalla Committee which has supported me throughout my five years as President, especially in the last six months. Thank you to Wende Sturgess who is retiring from the Committee as she intends to travel more in Australia. Thank you everyone."

### 'As Time Goes By' – Memoir Writing

It has been wonderful to return to class this year, with five new members joining returning students in sharing stories in class. February's topic, **'I Was There'**, elicited fascinating 'slices of life', including meeting the Queen in New Zealand as a young Girl Guide; hearing President Soekarno speak at the opening of a new university in Aceh, Indonesia in 1962; and being there when the Russell Street bombing occurred on March 27<sup>th</sup>1986. Stories written for '**One Moment, This Year (2021)**' described the deep disappointment of continued absence from family during Covid and unforgettable moments of pure joy at eventually being together again.

**'Tree Stories'** proved to be a delightful topic in March, incorporating many captivating memories of childhood. Other **'Memories of Childhood'** were also shared, memories of a happy childhood in England and 'the big adventure' of migrating to Australia; also 'early 1940's' memories of train trips to wartime Melbourne and a father's departure from Spencer Street on the 'Spirit of Progress' before leaving for the war in Europe.

We will not be meeting on Anzac Day but have extended our meeting time in late May to from 1 to 4 pm. Please bring two 500-word stories and a small plate of afternoon tea or some chocolates to share!

The topics? **'Community'** - "Write about a community you participated in, taking this opportunity to write about a slice of your life's journey which may be of interest to your family. It could be a community in which you felt a really 'good fit', a community which changed you, perhaps even a community you were glad to leave behind...." and **'Long Lost Friend'** – "Have you ever come across a long-lost friend years after first meeting them? Tell us about the time when you first knew them, how you lost touch and the major changes in your life since, how you met them again, and your reflections on doing so. Are you still in contact? Explain what has happened since you came across them again." (other 'long lost'?...eg. family member, item, pet...)".

The alternate topics are 'Anzac Day' and 'A Friendship Tested'.

**Report of March outing to Loombah Weir** 



Twelve people attended our first activity for 2022, on Thursday 10 March.

On a lovely autumn morning we drove along Upper Ryans Creek Rd, then parked at the closed entrance to Loombah Reservoir. Most of the group had not visited this area.

We birded along the walking tracks down the hill from the parking area, in a tall forest of Victorian Blue Gum and Narrow-leafed Peppermint, with a mixed wattle understorey.

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We had great views of 3 Eastern Yellow Robins chasing one another, a flock of Red-browed Finches, several Grey Fantails, Brown Thornbills, Superb Fairywrens, and King Parrots and Crimson Rosellas. Later in the walk we found a few Yellow-tufted Honeyeaters and White-naped Honeyeaters.

It was interesting to look up at the dam wall and watch Ryans Creek flowing below us in a deep and narrow gorge. We also saw the pipeline that carries drinking water to Benalla. We recorded 23 bird species. Here is the link to the eBird list

It was serious brainwork for our second session, with emphasis on memory and some cryptic homework. Some, who clearly need the work, forgot to attend!



#### **Coin Collectors**

Our Coin Collectors group continues to grow with three new members joining us at the March meeting to take our active membership to eleven. A common theme among our new collectors is, "I have had a tin of coins in the cupboard for a long while and am not sure if any are valuable". If this is you, bring them along and the Coin Collectors will look at them and give you some advice.

Pat has a tin of coins in his cupboard that he is bringing along to our next meeting, but in the meantime will "noodle" its contents with added interest.

Bill circulated at our meeting a proof 2014 American quarter dollar. He also passed around uncirculated \$200 gold 1985 and 1986 Perth Mint collectable coins.

Peter has a number of coins in jars and like Pat is noodling to bring along some specimens to our next meeting.

Rupe presented a number of coins in plastic folders in an old coin album. Coins were generally pre-decimal and from many overseas countries including England and Europe. The plastic transparent coin holders were purchased from a news agency in Wangaratta.

Jill had several coins of unknown origin, including a coin with foreign letters and the word Palestine 1927 on one face and a hollow centre. A suggestion was made that a google search was a valuable tool that may assist to identify and value a coin of interest.

Asha presented a State Savings Bank token displaying an effigy of Captain Cook dated 1970. It was noted tokens are as collectable as coins with many different varieties in existence and popular in times past.

Doug circulated to the group his carded collection of coloured 50 cent pieces depicting early model GM Holden cars including the FX, FC and Kingswood models. These coins are still available for purchased from the Ram.

David spoke to and circulated a number of coins including a full album set of coloured \$2 coins 1988 – 2021 and a number of carded 50 cent gold and silver collectors' coins.

David and Doug have a number of coin resource books that are offered on loan to the group to help members assess their collections and generally improve their collector knowledge. These will be brought to the next meeting for loan.

Members were also advised the Benalla Post Office have Ram coins on display for sale and will order coins in on request, from their Ram catalogue.

#### **Creative Writing**

A great set of stories again this month. We had three prompts to choose from:

- The reflections on the still water of the lake, did not reveal what lay beneath
- The hotel was deserted. Salt and pepper shakers sat on the dust covered tables.

We started with a quick challenge identifying collective nouns for a range of animals. Some were well known, such as a **swarm** of bees. Others were less familiar – a **stand** of flamingos. We finished the exercise with sharing some ideas for a collective noun for a group of caravans. Some ideas were more creative than others – nuisance, lumbering, blockage, chaos – but also ideas such as caravan (of caravans) and convoy.

We talked about the concept of "white space" – creating space between paragraphs – and length of sentences – not too long and varying the length. Feedback was always positive, even when it was providing ideas for improvement, such as overuse of the same word in a paragraph or adding an ending that was not necessary. Overall, the stories were interesting, varied and appreciated.

#### **Exploring the Universe**

#### A Journey back to the Evolution of Stars and Planets and more.

After our first session we were asked about the basics of astronomy and cosmology, so in March we stepped back in time for our newer explorers.

Our Journey started about 13.8 billion years ago with the evolution of the early Universe. In the so-called dark ages before there was light, small dense clouds that contained the first elements, hydrogen and helium, collapsed under their own gravity, becoming hot enough to trigger nuclear fusion reactions. This led to the formation of the first stars and galaxies. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VP2zzzA4KRU</u>

We studied the birth of stars from the dense molecular clouds of gas and dust. Viewed film from radio telescopes that have penetrated the clouds of dust to capture brilliant images of the youngest stars. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PH3IPcegi0A</u>

Planets form in the dust rings around a young star from the leftovers of dust and gas. With with less mass, weaker gravity and energy, they don't have elements for nuclear fusion. A brilliant film of planet evolution. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=v-StcUdmRB0</u> Stars like to hang out with each other. Scientists think the first galaxies formed around one million years after the start of the Universe. They were very immature, and gravity drew them together. With merges and collisions and more star formation they eventually became the beautiful galaxies we see today.

We finished the afternoon touching briefly on the electromagnetic spectrum. To understand images taken by the large telescopes, we must first understand the nature of light and colour. Our human eyes perceive only visible light in combinations of red, green and blue. We can't see the information from infrared, ultraviolet, or radio telescopes. It's accessible to technology so in this case the colours depicted of spectral elements are presented in representative colours that we can understand.

Asha described finding details of her grandmother; while Elly described a family history full of passion and pain, intriguing us all. Her gain – finding a lot of documents related to her mother, her pain, continuing mystery surrounding her father.

Graeme shared intriguing details of a Great Grandfather who fought in many theatres of war. He is buried in a lone grave which is now on Aboriginal designated land. His GGF has a musket ball still in his body which could be of historic significance. Graeme is not sure what to do next, however will contact local Aboriginal elders to see what can be done. Graeme also shared symbols he is using to assist him to track and follow up people and events in the family records he is creating.

Returning member Jane's role as the Secretary of the Benalla Family Research Group is proving to be a gain for the class. Jane shared news of Benalla History Week events from the 26 - 29 April (keep an eye on the website for details) and news of a free Zoom webinar 'Discovering Trove'.

Our Family Story topic for sharing after the coffee break was <u>'Hunch'</u>. Following a hunch to try a different variation of a person's name – 'Jas' instead of 'James'; 'Annabella' instead of 'Annie'; '...1st Duke of Kingston upon Hull' instead of 'General Hull' – resolved what had been frustrating problems for three class members. Following a hunch based on our session on DNA last year by Jim Burnell proved worthwhile, as did pursuing a hunch gleaned from reading an article about German citizens interned in Australia during WWI. Inserting an advertisement in The Belfast Telegraph newspaper proved another successful hunch, unearthing Irish relatives and leading to treasured outcomes. Finally, a hunch related to a mystery surrounding the paternity of a family member developed after finding a very small newspaper report of a 1906 trial. This named a possible candidate whose history has proven easy to find. Next step–the trial transcript!

Our April 28<sup>th</sup> session has been cancelled to provide members with the opportunity to attend Benalla Family Research Group's Australian Heritage Festival workshops that week.

#### **Film Discussion Group**

#### Our films for discussion this month were **Belfast** and **King Richard**

All the class had seen **Belfast**. It was based on the troubles in Belfast at the end of 1969. Filmed predominantly in B&W, it fitted the era well. It did show some of the violence, but this was not in your face and was necessary to bring our what was happening at the time. Performances were excellent. Themes brought out were the living conditions, the importance of family, difficulties around migration and that religious differences did not matter if the people were caring and good.

Everyone found it a film worth seeing, rating mainly around 4/5 to - 4.5/5, although there was one 5/5.

A few people had seen *King Richard*. It is the story of how Richard Williams coached Serena and Venus to bring them to top ranked tennis players. We were given a new picture of Richard Williams. Media have over the years made him out to be an ogre when it came to their training (he might not have always been a very pleasant person outside the era covered). The film showed a different side. He was certainly single minded about their coaching, but also wanted the girls to have a childhood and education. As a result, he did not allow them to join the junior tennis circuit as young as some other tennis players. For example, he saw how Jennifer Capriati struggled after her initial entry into professional tennis and he did not want this for his daughters. Performances were good.

Generally, it was well received, with a rating of 3/5.

We also briefly discussed **Spencer**. It covered just three days at Sandringham as the marriage between Prince Charles and Diana finally broke. It was not sympathetic towards Diana, focussing more on her mental and physical problems. The character of Diana seemed to be overplayed, with some of her mannerisms too repetitive. The only redeeming feature was the comparison between Diana and Anne Boleyn when her marriage with Henry VIII came to an end.

We are again looking at two films for our April class. These are *Marry Me*, a light romantic comedy, and *Death on the Nile* is a new version of the Agatha Christie book starring Kenneth Branagh as Poirot. Class members can watch either of both the films for discussion on 13 April.

#### **Meet and Mingle**

After officiating at the Annual General meeting of U3A, Rosie Koop, executive officer of The Tomorrow Today Foundation, spoke at Meet and Mingle about the achievements of the organisation in the last dozen or so years in lifting educational standards in the city. She said in 2007, a report called *Dropping* off the Edge came out which identified Benalla people, young people in particular, as being highly disadvantaged. It said the one thing which could break this disadvantage was education. In 2010 Tomorrow Today decided to do something about this. Ms Koop described their focus on Early Childhood programs such as the PEEP program, the improved outcomes which have been statistically as well as anecdotally evident resulting from this work and the programs introduced to improve access of young people to work experience. She said that in a 2017 survey, only a bit more than 30 per cent of Benalla students were having work experience. "But then over the next two years, we boosted that [workplace experience involvement] to 90 per cent". Ms Koop said Tomorrow Today is now supported by a highly productive partnership of 124 local partners. "They run from all schools to recruitment companies, Benalla Health, employers, and Benalla Council".



John Weinert from *Road Safe North East* will be the guest speaker at the April Meet and Mingle which will be held on Wednesday 20 April 2022 at 10am in our U3A room.

John, who formerly worked for Vic Roads, will do a Power Point presentation aimed at the older driver. This Safe Driver Presentation will include new road rules which have come into law recently and may not have been adequately publicised. John will incorporate parts of his Mobility Devices Program into his talk.

U3A members will have the opportunity to ask questions at the end of the presentation. It is a great way to keep up to date with the latest road rules. We hope to see many members come along

### Stock and Land

#### Stud grows 100-fold in 50 years

Our guest speaker for March was Tim Finger from the 1200-acre Riga Angus Stud on the Midland Highway and the Broken River, about 10km north west of Mansfield.

Tim told us his grandfather and grandmother, George and Irika Kakis, established the stud with three pedigreed females, at Orana Park, Healesville in 1972. Those three females came from the Swansea Stud at Swanpool.

As numbers grew, they moved the stud initially to Tolmie and then in 1995 to its current location.

Today farm manager 27-year old Tim, his father Ian Finger and Irika's daughter Vera Finger, his mother, run about 300 stud females on Nillahcootie Park. Tim's sister Kate works for the Birchip Cropping Group in the Mallee and is a consultant to the farm operation.

Muscling, marbling, yield and other important characteristics determining meat eating quality, are continually being refined within this female base, Tim said.

Riga concentrates on selling bulls as yearlings – their next sale is



on the property on April 13 – and one previous customer, recorded 100 pregnancies from one such Riga sire, in one year. With such activity, it took him a while to grow out though, the customer said!

At our next Stock and Land on Tuesday 5th April at 10 am our guest will be Benalla man Ian Gill, who for many years produced and marketed super fine wool from his shedded sheep. As a result he established rock solid and highly lucrative contacts, largely with Italian wool spinners and elite fabric manufacturers - Ermenegildo Zegna for example. To show and feel, Ian will have samples of the wool his sheep produced as well.

#### **Tech Talks**

At our last Tech Talks we were fortunate enough to listen to two separate lectures.

Les Rodgers brought us up to date on the development of <u>Fusion Reactor Technology</u>. Fusion Technology applied to the production of electricity is slowly moving from the Theoretical to the Practical and is now a problem for the Engineering Profession which needs to build the Fusion Machines. A surprising number of Fusion Machines already exist, not all of them in states advanced enough to produce practical amounts of electricity. However new machines are being built and hopefully will come on-line in our lifetime.

We also listened to a lecture by Ian Maver on the James Webb Deep Space Telescope. This telescope was only launched in late December but is now in a position to start operating. Literally, it is parked well off shore so to speak - way out in space and held rigidly in place by the gravitational forces of three bodies - the sun, the moon and earth. Such is the nature of physics it will not require any external source of energy to hold it in place. It will sit facing away from the earth and will look deep into the infra-red spectrum in space.
