Investment

At the December meeting of Investment we had a very interesting talk by Les Rodgers on a new technology which is being investigated by the ASX as a possible replacement for the current CHESS system. The CHESS system has been used by the ASX for over 25 years and is likely to be replaced in two or three years time by Permissioned Distributed Ledger Technology or DLT. This DLT system may provide a slightly shorter settlement period for trades as well as being more secure.

As a follow up to our November meeting we noted the outcome of the Rio Tinto share Buy Back. We mentioned that BHP was also having a share Buy Back and a Special Dividend in January 2019. We also noted that the Coles demerger from Wesfarmers had happened and looked at the price of the demerged Coles shares.

At Investment for interest and information we run a Monthly Share selection, members being able to select a share of their choice which they think will make the most gain in the next month. No cash outlay is involved. At our December meeting we congratulated Nola McDonald who won the 2018 Monthly share selection. Nola had several large paper wins and was awarded the usual bottle of marmalade, and this year also a U3A Benalla pen. Unfortunately Nola was not at the December meeting but her prize was forwarded to her via Noel.

The Long Term share selection for 2018 which was a close contest was won by Margaret Jenkins with the runner up being Pauline Bailey.

Politics & Current Affairs



Gita-Kristie Korimbo, 4th Year Mechanical engineering student, Goroka, Eastern Highlands Province, Papua New Guinea, recently visited Benalla and Tatong and during this time, with her travelling companion Vivienne Kiyo, spoke to the Politics group. Class members very much enjoyed meeting them and hearing their presentation. A fascinating essay by Gita 'My Impressions of Australia' was published in February's Tatong Tattler and has just been published in full on the Politics page of the web site after being submitted by Andi Stevenson. An extract is published below.

'When I first visited Australia in December 2015 I had just finished year twelve and had no idea Australia would be as multicultural and BIG as it turned out to be. The small town I grew up in lies in the heart of Papua New Guinea in the Eastern Highlands Province about 1600m above sea level with a growing population of 19-20,000 people.

On my second visit I travelled with a friend, Vivian Kiyo. We both had an exciting time visiting Melbourne, meeting friends, visiting Brian's daughter Robyn and his granddaughters Evelyn and Claire in Bendigo, we also visited Brian's son Leigh and his wife Sue with their two boys Digby and Rory in Swan Hill, and we managed to find our way through the Southern Cross Station and back to Benalla. I thought finding our way home was the exciting part because it tested our skills of reading tickets and signs and it also gave us time to sight see the streets of Melbourne a bit without getting lost

It was indeed a great experience for me and I am truly grateful towards the Leigh Grant Vial scholarship that sponsored my years 11 and 12 at boarding school in Goroka and also Brian and Andrea doing the unthinkable of bringing two Papua New Guinean girls with no exposure whatsoever of the world to Australia not once but twice and giving us experiences of a lifetime. These experiences have added values beyond words to our lives and have broadened so much of our understanding.

I am currently in Lihir, an island in the New Ireland Province of Papua New Guinea doing my industrial training with New Crest Gold Mine. I will be doing my final year this year at the Papua New Guinea University of Technology in Lae, Morobe Province and will be graduating next year (if all goes well). I didn't leave Melbourne with a heavy heart, I know I want to return and hopefully this time with a degree and two visits of experience."

Stock and Land

One hop cone is all that is needed hop wise to produce one bottle of beer, Alison Earp, Myrrhee, told our Stock and Land group December. However the higher the alpha acids in the resin glands of the hops, the lesser the volume of hops needed, for a given degree of bitterness of a beer. Alison said she married into the hop industry when she teamed up with husband Les at Myrrhee. He died nearly five years ago, but Alison has continued in the industry by growing about 15 old, mostly aroma rich hop varieties for boutique breweries.

Although she doesn't drink beer Alison is quite taken with a green hop derived boutique beer produced in the King Valley. Alison said the industry was more or less on an even keel – although hops were always much easier to grow than to sell - until entrepreneur John Elliot decided the industry was a cash cow in the 1980s.

"He established a large area of vines in Australia but took no account of the fact that growers tend thousands of hectares of hops overseas and Australia could never have any impact on the world price"

Even the current Rostrevor hop garden near Myrtleford, set up by John Elliot, grows 100s of hectares of hops and "burns off the competition," Alison said. It also breeds new high alpha varieties which growers like her cannot get access to. Botanically hops, a perennial herb, are closest genetically to marijuana. But they don't contain THC, the active ingredient which makes marijuana so desirable.

Alison said hop roots are extremely tough and will grow during summer up to more than 5m vertically along strings tied to overhead wires. The old varieties she grows are not easily machine harvestable and since the demise of readily available mostly Asian work crews for stringing up and training vines and picking hops — the biggest work areas — the crop had become much less economical to grow.

As well growers must invest in about \$2m worth of processing equipment on farm, including a \$1m pelleter. At their peak the Earps used to produce each March/April about 400 bales weighing 120kg each, of kiln dried hops.

Today there are two main agents handling sales from about 30 growers with Myrrhee remaining the principal point of production in Victoria. It is not historically and currently possible for growers to sell direct to brewers.
