A Different View of German History

It had strict civil rights for all. It had one vote one value. It had universal suffrage for both males and females. Governments had to have a more than 50% majority in Parliament. A myriad of balances were built in to ensure democracy reigned and no one group could take advantage.

It accepted the conditions of the Versailles Treaty and attempted to comply with its conditions.

It goes without saying that pretty well all political classes, all individual parties and all pressure groups hated it with a passion.

Next month we will discuss the Nazi Period.

Our local post office displays a regular collection in the PO foyer of recently released coins and medallions from the RAM (Royal Australian Mint).

David circulated the June 2021 monthly catalogue from Downies Collectables. Downies is a large Australian coin and note dealer whose coloured catalogues depict their sale items in great photographic detail. The catalogue is also available on-line.

Demystifying Psychology

Lockdown meant this months' Discussion Group was cancelled. So, we particularly look forward to the July gathering which will be the last for the Semester 1 program and a chance to share morning tea. (Details below).

But we were luckier with the Content session on 18 June when we looked at child development and addiction.

The concept of "child" is relatively modern dating from the 15th century. Moving forward to the more recent era and the notion of "childhood" increases in acceptance and interest characteristics quite distinct from those of adults. The research bank grew, medical knowledge improved, children lived longer which encouraged parental emotional investment, and the legal world offered increasing protection for a child' right to have a childhood. Many more factors contributed to the current view of childhood as a discreet phase of life.

Phillipe Aries – author of <u>Centuries of Childhood</u> (1960) – is credited will being the first to record the historical development of the concept of "childhood".

Many theorists have commented on the development of children. We focused on developmental theorists Jean Piaget (1896 – 1980) and Lawrence Kohlberg (1927–1987). Both hypothesised that children move through discrete stages of development in many areas, and that these stages are consistently observable, including moral development.

Paiget's theorises can be explored with this experiment. Ask a couple of children of different ages to listen to both the following scenarios, then ask "Who was naughtier?" - Margaret or Marie and why?

Scenario #1

A little girl called Margaret went and took her mother's scissors one day when her mother was out. She played with them for a bit. Then, as she didn't know how to use them properly, she made a little hole in her dress.

Scenario #2

There was once a little girl who was called Marie. She wanted to give her mother a nice surprise and cut out a piece of sewing for her. But she didn't know how to use the scissors properly and cut a big hole in her dress.

Kohlberg (1963) extended Paiget's theory to include 6 life-time stages. It is fascinating viewing the video of Kohlberg's "Theory of Moral Development" and reflect on day-to-day examples of each stage.

After a cuppa break, we looked at the potentially fraught topic of addiction. More often the link between addiction and illicit drugs is the focus of family, community and media concern. In this case we looked at some addictions we tend to make fun of ... like chocolate and other carbs. There are cycles for most things

and addiction is no different. The cycles of addiction and change are simple and incredibly useful ways to look at often confusing and discouraging behaviours – of our own and of others.

So, I bet you know the most used drugs in Australia? Along with much more information, the answer is in the slide show on the U3A website. Surprised?

Exploring the Universe

The Planet Venus is an enigma.

Venus is Earth's neighbour but, in some ways, we know more about the surface of the dwarf planet Pluto in the far reaches of the solar system, than we know about the planet next door.

Shining so brightly in the night sky that it's known as the morning and evening star, second only in brightness to the moon, Venus is a rocky volcanic planet that has a thick hellish atmosphere that reflects 70% of the Suns light. On Earth we have a magnificent view out into the universe. If you were on Venus, you would never see the stars!

Scientists think that Venus may have once supported life. Only five light years away and almost the same size as Earth, with temperatures of 470 C. hot enough to melt lead, why has Venus evolved so differently?

There have been many space craft mapping the surface and studying the atmosphere. The Russians landed probes on the surface in the 1970's and 80's that survived the extreme heat and radiation for no more than 2 hours and theirs are the only images we have of the surface.

Last year Dmitry Rogozin, head of the Russian Space Corporation Roscosmos, told reporters, "Resuming Venus exploration is on our agenda.... We think that Venus is a Russian planet, so we shouldn't lag behind."

NASA and The European Space Agency have announced plans for missions to explore Venus. This will be an extreme challenge for technology.

Last month's 'Exploring the Universe' class was a non-event. We look forward to resuming on Tuesday July 20th at 2 p.m. when amongst other things we will explore the mysterious Planet Venus. Why not join us? Everyone is welcome.

Family Research

Eleven people met for a U3A session of Family Research on Thursday 24 June. In the pains and gains session (ie: what was achieved since the last meeting), DNA results (good and "bad"); techniques of using Ancestry tools to enhance research; difficulties encountered with Irish records; shipping records results and stories about sharing of information with family were recounted. Wendy Sturgess brought along a family bible and two old family albums which she recently had beautifully restored and collected since the last meeting.

Jim Burnell, a retired Professor of Molecular Biology at James Cook University, then shared his detailed knowledge on DNA and its regulation. He explained how the interpretation we receive after submitting a test

works with identification of our ancestral lineage. He also explained how regulation of the genes impacts in disease processes and the potential for cure. This kept everyone fascinated and many questions were answered.

After the break, members spoke about contacts they had made with new people during their individual research and their ongoing relationship with them, helpful or otherwise, in response to June's topic 'Found'.

Next month's topic is 'I wish I'd met/known'. The brief: 'Sometimes while we are researching we come across someone we wish we'd met or known. Write about them, what intrigued you about them and what questions you would like to ask them if you'd met.'

Film as Literature

Our film for discussion in June was "Six Minutes to Midnight". Due to the sudden introduction of restrictions not everyone was able to view the film, and we were not able to meet in person to discuss the film. Those who did see it shared their review via email.

East Sussex, Southeast England, August 15, 1939. Seventeen days before WWII, an English teacher disappears from Bexhill-on-Sea's Augusta Victoria College: a prestigious finishing school for the daughters of Germany's most influential, upper-class families. He has made a panicky call about a missing camera before he disappears.

Six days later a new English teacher, Thomas Miller (played by Eddie Izzard), turns up at the school. When he first turns up, the headmistress (Judy Dench) is suspicious of him.

As Miller teaches Adolf Hitler's league of Nazi girls, against the backdrop of the unaccountable disappearance of his predecessor, the new tutor finds himself trying to shed light on the mystery. German spies enter the picture. Now, the clock is ticking, and strange behaviours raise suspicions among colleagues.





It turns out that both the missing teacher and Miller work for the British Government. Judy Dench's character Saturday evening is an innocent, being fooled by the PE teacher who is the German operative. And of course the girls are saved but kept in Britain.

This was promoted as a thriller and drama but missed the mark. There is a scene where Miller is running from the police when he is suspected of killing someone. It ends up being a bit of a "Keystone Cops" scenario, rather than serious chase. This may have been intentional to relieve the tension, but I am not convinced it was the right approach. There was also a scene where Miller is hiding under a desk that I think missed the mark in creating tension.

No performances stood out. Judy Dench will always perform well, but her role was minor. There was potential for a good performance from one of the girls, but the screenplay let this opportunity slip, even though it was important to the end of the film.

The cinematography was the highlight with coastal scenes and wild seas.

The film had potential, but the portrayal was weak with too much predictability. he start was quite slow, without much indication as to where it was going. Overall, we gave it a rating of 2 out of 5.

At our July class we will be discussing "June Again" and "Cruella".

The things we will watch for in viewing the film include:

- Did you enjoy the film? What in particular did you like?
- Was there anything that you did not like?
- What did you think about the cinematography?
- What did you think of the performances? Any strong performances that stand out? Any weak performances that spoilt the film?

Wine Appreciation

This Wine Appreciation outing was actually a Research Project! Were those glowing Facebook reviews of Warrabilla Wines <u>really</u> accurate? Well, our group, armed with clipboards and learned expressions, in the end had to agree; those reviews were indeed well deserved. Seated at long, beautifully crafted tables made from slices of polished Red Gum, we were welcomed by the friendly, enthusiastic Cellar Door team of Laura and Deb, who shared their extensive knowledge of wines and winemaking with us while we sampled generous samples of each varietal, all meeting with nods of approval. Even Keith, nurturing a bandaged hand, was still able to raise the odd glass or two.

Now for the History and Technical Stuff... A family owned and run affair in Rutherglen, Winemaker and owner, Andrew Sutherland Smith and his wife, Carol, started Warrabilla in 1991. The Cellar Door was opened at its current site west of Rutherglen five years later. The Winery prides itself on producing robust reds of distinction, particularly its flagship Durif. With an annual crush of approximately 150 tons of fruit each year, Warrabilla Wines' low yielding vines (1.5 to 2 tons per acre) ensure maximum ripening and



concentration of colour, flavour and tannin. Whilst the wines are designed for long term cellaring, they are also well balanced and (fortunately) easy to drink at an early age. Andrew's skills as a Winemaker have been



recognised many times in Wine Shows around Australia, with a string of trophies and medals to his credit.

*Now for Lunch...*The U3A group was now in a mellow mood and ready for lunch. The Rogers had chosen the Stonegrill Restaurant in Corowa's Hotel Australia.

Crossing the Border proved hassle-free and the venue in the Main Street easy to locate (unlike the Winery location for one missing carload!)

The Hotel is historic and the main dining room, with its original stained-glass windows, warm and cosy, but due to group numbers, we had to be seated in a side room. Most of us were happy with our meal choices from the blackboard Seniors Special options.
