'As Time Goes By' – Memoir Writing

How wonderful to be able to meet in the U3A meeting room again to share our writing, to welcome returning and new class members and to thank those who contributed to the wonderful collections of stories published on the website over the long 2020 Covid break.

After an introduction to the course and the nature of memoirs as 'slices from life', stories were shared on the first of our summer break topics, <u>'One Moment, This Year' (1920</u>). These beautiful stories largely drew on lived experiences during the Pandemic. Stories shared for the second topic <u>'A love letter to travel'</u> took us away to 'Trim on the banks of the Boyne', Ireland; Hans Heysen's home 'The Cedars' at Hahndorf; to Barcelona; Yosemite National Park; Scotland; Morang homestead in central New South Wales; and Annamult in County Kilkenny, Ireland. These stories can be found, with Claire's early submission 'Bali' and some soon to be added 'love letters' to the Camino de Compostelo in Spain; and also Mexico, on the website.

This year two 500 word topics will be suggested each month, one new to intrigue longer term members, the other a previously offered 'gem' for newer members to add to their portfolio of stories.

The new topic for March is **'Too Hard Basket'** – write about a time when you faced a dilemma which might have to be put into your 'too hard basket'. Unravel what happened, whether it was a 'problem solved', was resolved over time or perhaps remains in your too hard basket to this day.

The alternate topic is **'New in Town'** - *Have you ever been the new person in town? Or did someone else's arrival have a profound impact on you? Share your story in 500 words*.

An aura of joy and contentment seemed to be in the room as we said farewells at the end of the session, perhaps because we had been reminiscing about treasured travel destinations, perhaps because we could be together again.

Easy Walks

Coming up - Wednesday 7th April 2021 - Mt Pilot

We will be climbing to the Mt Pilot summit, followed by lunch at Woolshed Falls. Mt Pilot and the Falls are two of three highlights in the Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park.

The walk commences at the intersection of C377(Beechworth-Chiltern Rd), and Old Coach Road.From here to the Mt Pilot picnic area is about 2.7km, with a further 300m to the summit lookout, for a total walk of about 6km. Poles/walking sticks are suggested for the final 300m as it can be steep in parts. There is a parking area along Old Coach Road for those wanting a shorter trek, but the road is well formed and easy to walk. The summit lookout provides a stunning panoramic view and is a must see, for those who feel safe to do so.

After conquering the summit, we will drive to the nearby Woolshed Falls picnic area for lunch. The waterfalls and pools are close to the picnic area, for those with time to explore further.

Demystifying Psychology

Like 2020 ... 2021 has been a great start to the semester program. We were lucky enough to skirt around the short lockdown and so managed to meet twice in February. A 100% improvement compared to 2020!

This year semester 1 Demystifying Psychology content will be repeated in semester 2. We meet twice a month.

After our first month at the Hub, we recently redesigned Demystifying Psychology to allow all sessions to be 'face to face' and improve visibility of powerpoint and video content during Course Sessions.

Course Sessions have been rescheduled to the third Friday afternoon of the month from 1 - 3 pm in the U3A Meeting Room (our pre-covid timeslot). These sessions are designed around planned topics and the content is displayed using PowerPoint and a large TV screen. There is a lot of opportunity for discussion in a relatively structured environment. **Our next session will be a Course Session in the U3A Meeting Room on Friday March 19th at 1pm**.

Demystifying Psychology Discussion Group sessions (held previously on Zoom), will now be held 'face to face' at the Cooinda Hub on the 1st Tuesday of the month from 10 to 12 midday. Our discussion group sessions are a free-for-all and a lovely surprise. No planning goes into the session and topics are generated by participants on the day.

Depending on the busyness of "Covid Normal" calendars, participants join both or either of the Demystifying sessions.

The aim of Demystifying Psychology is to have a lighthearted look at psychology. To do this it is necessary to be familiar with some of the frequently used concepts and words. So, that is where we have started (again) in 2021.

In February we looked at:

- What is Psychology and its purpose.
- What is a theory, who are some the most known theorists, and what are "schools" of theory?
- Part of how disorders are diagnosed and described in the DSMVI (Diagnostic Statistical Manual, number 5).

.. and then we ran out of time!

In March we will complete the DSM discussion, look at preferred coping styles (and play some games around this), consider ethics in psychology (and listen to some decidedly dastardly examples of historical ethical issues), and finally the history of psychology including the influence of women in psychology.

Exploring the Universe

The Space Highway to Mars has been busy this year with three spacecraft hurtling towards the Red Planet.

They were launched in July 2020 when Earth was at its closest distance to Mars. An opportunity that only arises every two years when Earth 'laps' Mars in their annual orbits around the Sun.

During February all three spacecraft have arrived at their destination and have successfully been inserted into Mars gravity field to orbit the planet. The first arrival was the United Arab Emirates' orbiter named 'Hope' that will study the planet's atmosphere and how the remnants of Mars once abundant water supply now leak into space.

The Chinese 'Tianwen-1' mission entered Mars orbit one day later. This is an ambitious program with an orbiter that will attempt to land a lander and a rover in May or June. The rover is solar powered and will explore Mars for 90 days using a ground penetrating radar, studying the soil, seeking signs of life and sub - surface water and ice.

NASA's U.S. 'Mars Mission 2020' has landed a rover named 'Perseverance' on the surface. Its task is to study and collect rocks and soil for possible return to Earth and to search for signs of ancient life. Aboard Perseverance is an experimental small, drone like helicopter. The challenge is to fly it in Mars' reduced atmospheric conditions.

Cameras on the landing equipment filmed Perseverance's descent to the surface and a microphone has recorded the hum of the rover and the sounds of the Martian wind.

Why not join us at 'Exploring the Universe' on Tuesday 16th March 2 p.m - 4 p.m at the Senior Citizens building to see the excellent film of the landing and listen to the first sounds recorded from another planet, all on our large High Definition TV.

Family Research

Meeting in the U3A Meeting Room for the first time after the Covid break, we were warmly welcomed by U3A's President Dorothy Webber, who wished us a successful year.

Wendy Sturgess began the session with an introduction to the goals and nature of the group, which this year includes a family story telling component. An absorbing hour or so followed in which each person shared an overview of their research into their family to date. We were so impressed with the things people have already achieved. This included work undertaken to develop family trees, to search for missing relatives and to resolve other mysteries, often over quite long periods of time. We heard tales of travels to locate ancestors in cemeteries far away. People spoke of writing books including Marcus's 'Covid Project' written for his children and Rupe's goal of publishing the book he has written about his Cheetham forebears. We were fascinated by Wendy Webster's Early Winton Settlers project. We listened in awe as Marg described the efforts she has made to find her mother, and more. A goal setting and skills analysis work sheet was completed to provide feedback to convenors about goals, strengths, and learning needs.

Bev introduced the Family Research page on the U3A website after the break, using her family history blog to share her story, <u>'My Roman Nose'</u>, for February's writing topic 'Family Traits'. A fascinating collection of stories followed, with traits including having an identifiable laugh; fair skin prone to sunburn and desperate efforts to tan; the vertical challenge of being of Cornish descent; persistence and a sense of humour; distinctive dark eyes and hair; a love of gardening, a nursing career and an enduring passion for trains, and more. The role of DNA results in confirming family legends of links to people in far off lands was explored.

At the end of the session Wendy presented a folder she has prepared showing a time sequence of illustrations of costumes over 200 years, explaining that it may prove useful in identifying unnamed people in old photographs. We look forward to bringing along old photos to compare with the illustrations in Wendy's folder during the year.

Our March writing topic is **'Family Treasure'** - The brief - Write a story of 150 to 400 words (or prepare an 'show and tell' presentation) about a family treasure you are finding, or will find, it hard to let go of. It doesn't have to be an expensive treasure – it can be as humble as your great-grandmother's recipe book or teapot. If possible bring it along. Explain its importance to you and where it fits in your family tree, perhaps using a genogram to help you to do so.

Film as Literature

What a treat! We were able to meet face to face for our February Film discussion. We have some new members to the class, although not all were able to join us for our first class. One of our members opened her home, making it possible for us to meet for our class. We hope to have access to a second room that is being made available for U3A use once the renovations are complete. At this stage we will almost certainly be able to meet at the Seniors Community Centre in April.

The film we discussed for our February class was "The Dry". This was based on the book by Jane Harper. It is set a fictional town in Australia. Federal Agent Aaron Falk returns to his hometown, Kiewarra, after an absence of over twenty years to attend the funeral of his childhood friend, Luke, who allegedly killed his wife Karen and son Billy (a baby daughter was spared) before taking his own life. Luke's mother is sure that this was not the case and persuades Aaron to stay and investigate. Aaron is sure the deaths are connected to the death twenty years earlier of friend, Ellie Deacon, when they were all teenagers. With the help of the local sergeant, Aaron investigates the events. He eventually solves the death of his friend and family. In the final scenes, he discovers who killed Ellie. As with murder mysteries in general there are twists and turns along the way.

Three key characters are Aaron Falk (played by Eric Bana), school friend Gretchen (played by Genevieve O'Reilly) and Greg Raco, the sergeant (played by Keir O'Donnell). It was filmed predominantly in the Wimmera-Mallee area of Victoria with Minyip and Beulah key among the towns used.

The film moves back and forward between the events twenty years earlier and the current time. It does mean concentrating to keep track of what was happening when, but this does not detract from some good performances and cinematography.

The screenplay was generally close to the story, with some of the dialogue lifted straight from the book. Depiction of Australian rural life and scenes gave a true picture. There was specific mention of the houses and the pub as being authentic.

Overall a good film rated by members as a 4 out of 5 and a pleasant experience back in a cinema!

Our March discussion will be on "A Call to Spy" which opened at BPACC on 18 February.

The things we will watch for in viewing the film include:

- Did you enjoy the film? What in particular did you like?
- Was there anything that you did not like?
- What did you think about the cinematography?
- What did you think of the performances? Any strong performances that stand out? Any weak performances that spoilt the film?
- Overall rating out of 5.

Let's Talk Books

Many thanks to Lorraine for hosting our first 'Let's Talk Books' for February. The Library will not be opening to groups for some time, but given the size of our group we will have to look for a new venue. We will continue to meet at Lorraine's home in Bridge Street in the meantime.

Many and varied books were read, some enjoyed, some a little disappointing. Noelle enjoyed *The Blue Sky between Sky and Water by Susan Abulhawa*, set in Palestine it follows the lives of the Baraka family from Deit Daras to Gaza and the dispersing of the family across the world. Unusual was *The Behaviour of Moths by Poppy Adams*. From her lookout on the first floor, Ginny watches and waits for her younger sister to return to the crumbling mansion that was once their idyllic childhood home. Vivien has not set foot in the house since she left, forty-seven years ago; Ginny, the reclusive moth expert, has rarely ventured outside it. Reliable Anita Shrieve wrote *A Change in Altitude*, set in the darkness and light of Kenya in Africa, worth a read. The Memoirs and Diaries of the poet Lord Byron who died in Greece in 1824, Byron Bay was named after him, was also worth the read. *The Highland Clans by Alistar Moffet*, held special interest for our reader following her family history. *The Diamond Hunter, Fiona McIntosh* was a little disappointing, everyone was too perfect. *The Champagne War*, also by Fiona, was voted a better read. Also mentioned was a regular column in the Women's Weekly called The Reading Room, which lists new releases. *The Dressmakers Secret, Rosalie Ham*, was disappointing, but *Dogs in Australian Art by Steven Miller* was delightful and very well produced. *A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles*, got the thumbs up, whilst the

Stock and Land

'New goat for cheese Winton farm working well'

After about one year developing a cheese from goat's milk business on 28ha (70 acres) at Winton, former mining engineer Moussa Taouk and his wife Vicky, are achieving returns which enable them to at least cover costs. Moussa brought his 18 month old daughter Marie with him to talk to Stock and Land's first U3A session in a year, on March 2. Their farm is between the Hume freeway and the Melbourne to Sydney railway line "which was why it was affordable," Moussa said.

Attractions from a goat farming point of view, include a 50m wide regent honeyeater plantation which encircles the farm and plantations of olives which provide snacks for the goats.

He said, "It also has a 1.8m high chicken wire fence around the boundary which is pretty handy for keeping foxes out" - "and goats in" was an audience comment.

Main improvements for the goats have involved fencing twelve 1.5 acre paddocks to cell graze and control worms, converting a shed into a dairy and making a cheesery.

Moussa and Vicky and their two children run eight Saanen milking goats which they milk by machine twice a day for a current yield of about four litres per goat per day.

Moussa said they should be getting up to six litres a day but had not achieved that yet.

"We thought they would be totally productive just eating grass but they do need absolutely top quality hay to do well".

On the marketing front, the Taouks have concentrated on the Benalla monthly market as well as the Violet Town, Yarrawonga and Wodonga markets.

Typically, they sell their cheese for up to about \$8 a kg, which as Moussa said, "compares well with dairy cow cheese at about \$7 a kg".

He said their ultimate aim was to milk about 20 goats producing four or five litres each per day. "If we were selling all that cheese – with eight goats we haven't had to throw any cheese out yet – we would have an income of about \$100,000 a year.

Guest speaker at our next Stock and Land class on Tuesday 6th April at 10 am will be Alana Johnston, a member of a fifth generation farming family, breeding cattle and growing trees near Benalla. A pioneer in rural women's leadership in Australia, Alana is a founding member of Australian Women in Agriculture and former President of the Foundation for Australian Agricultural Women.
