'As Time Goes By' - Memoir Writing

The U3A memoir writing workshop program has, from its inception, drawn extensively upon the ABC Open's online '500 Words' project. '500 Words' has provided inspiration and a framework for our sessions four years, providing suggested topics, tips, and links to other people's stories.

The ABC recently discontinued and archived ABC Open's '500 Words' Writing Projects. For the record, this program has proved to be a wonderful resource for U3A Benalla's memoir writing group.

Details of ABC Open's writing topics have been kept for use over time and we have begun to draw on other resources. Semester II's 500 words topics have largely been selected from Joy's book 'Creative Boot Camp'. For example, on Monday 25 August we will be sharing stories on 'Fear of Failure' and on Monday 23 September 'If only?' stories. As always, we write about something which, upon reflection, we feel we can comfortably share with others, rather than something which is likely to open old wounds and cause distress.

Our October topic will be the topic set for the Benalla Festival's Writing Competition and relate to this year's festival theme, 'Fiesta of Festivities: a celebration of events and festivals that bring the community together'. Fliers with full details of the writing competition topic should be available in the community shortly. Some members go on to enter the contest - with a member or two each year typically receiving awards!

Report of visit by Goulburn Valley U3A Bird-watching group to Reef Hills State Park on Wednesday 21 August 2019.

There was a lot of bird activity here, as a number of White Box trees were flowering, attracting a number of honeyeaters and lorikeets. As we walked along the track we came across a number of smaller bush birds, such as wrens, thornbills, treecreepers and sittellas. Most people headed off about lunch time, but some of us also visited a drier part of the park in Wattle Road, finding a few more birds in that area. It was good to have a chance to chat with another group like ours. Perhaps we can arrange another joint activity sometime in the future.

Vichy France is a dangerous place to be for Luc Bonet, a member of the French resistance, and Lisette Forestier who has been parachuted into France, and instructed by SO6 to seduce Markus Killian, a senior German officer and find out the plans of the German High Command. The problem for Lisette, is that she discovers that she can love two men, Luc and Markus, simultaneously, and is, therefore, in danger of compromising her mission. Fiona McIntosh does a fine job of keeping us in suspense, and her meticulous research into every aspect of the resistance has resulted in an authentic, and atmospheric novel.

Exploring the Universe

Of Comets and Eclipses

Comets were once considered bad luck. Every 133 years Comet "Swift Tuttle" streams past Earth in its headlong flight to orbit the Sun. Drawn by the Sun's gravity its speed increases and a long tail of dust develops as the heat of the Sun melts its icy covering. Then in its long elliptical orbit it sails out into the icy wastes of outer space again. In its wake it leaves a trail of debris suspended in space. Every year in August the Earth passes through this trail of dust and rocky fragments on its own journey around the Sun, sending a shower of meteors (or if you prefer, 'shooting stars') to burn up in the Earth's atmosphere. Every August Rupe tries to inspire us to leave our warm beds at 4 a.m. to watch for the Persieds meteor showers. No luck so far!

In July a Total Solar Eclipse passed over the European Southern Observatory of La Silla in the high Atacama Desert in Chile. This event had been overshadowed for us by the 50th Anniversary of the Moon Landing, so our August meeting was a chance to catch up with the incredible footage from the large telescopes.

A Total Solar Eclipse is caused by the Moon passing between the Earth and the Sun. We viewed the effect of the Moon's shadow blanketing the Sun and the ensuring darkness that falls over the land before the sun's light returns again.

The following film from the European Southern Observatory explains the action and effect of the Moon's shadow gradually blotting out the light of the Sun: https://youtu.be/SdjMZB1E8fM

Film and Literature

Our movie for discussion this month was "Red Joan".

Everyone enjoyed the film, although some did not think it was worth a second viewing. It is loosely based on the life of Melita Norwood, a Cold War Spy. It was originally a book by Jennie Rooney who took Melita Norwood's life story and turned it into a spy novel of the Cold War. A statement made by Norwood that she hoped her actions would help "Russia to keep abreast of Britain, America and Germany" was slightly reflected at the end of the film, although perhaps not quite the same intent. Addressing the media Joan Stanley said that her actions had been influenced by the Hiroshima nuclear bomb and her desire to keep the major countries equal and so help keep peace in the world. This is perhaps the closest the film comes the real life of Melita Norwood.

The film was more about the people than being a spy film which made it more enjoyable than had been expected. The story hung together well with perhaps one exception where at the end Joan's son who had previously rejected his mother, suddenly came out in her support. The performances by the key characters were solid, with Judi Dench performing strongly in her role as the older Joan Stanley. We were left wanting to know more of the story as to how Joan came back to England as the story (not the real life Melita) had her migrating to Australia with her husband.

We went on to discuss the issue around seeing films either based on real life or on books. It was generally agreed that seeing a film when knowing the real story can detract from enjoyment as there is always a tendency to compare the film with previous knowledge.

Our film for discussion at the 11 September August class is a *Late Night,* (with Emma Thompson,) which screens at BPACC between 16 to 23 August.

At the August meeting of investment Brian Vial spoke of the combination of low interest rates and the similarities between conditions before the GFC and the current state of the market. He illustrated his talk with the story of Mary, an Irish hotelkeeper who extended credit to her customers who were essentially unemployed alcoholics. The implications of this provided mirth but also showed what can happen when people are unable to repay their debts. One interesting facet of this talk was that in the days following Investment the market has had three sessions where there has been considerable selling off of shares and a substantial fall in the all ordinaries index.

The other segment that was considered at the meeting was some shares which had shown considerable growth during the year to date. However, these gains can be severely slashed if the market continues to adjust to unease in world trade conditions.


Publishing Your Writing

International trade issues in agriculture was the topic chosen by Dennis O'Brien (pictured) for our August meeting.

Dennis focussed on free trade agreements and said Australia was conducting negotiations for agreements with seven countries including India, Indonesia and Gulf nations.

Dr O'Brien said an FTA with the USA was close to resolution recently but fell apart because the US wanted blanket access to swamp our TV and cinema with content, which would probably have eliminated Australian content on our screens.

He also talked about exchange rate changes and how US imposed tariffs affected trade. In Australia, the recently lower Australian dollar against the US dollar, meant that exports from here were cheaper and imports more expensive.

In particular it makes education less expensive for overseas students.

Tech Savvy Talks

This month we looked at the role of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) in providing reports and recommendations to governments concerning climate change. The most recent reports are AS 5 (Assessment Report 5) of 2013 and SR 1.5 of 2018 (Special Report 1.5). Also released earlier this year was IPCC 2019 a Special Report on Climate Change and Land. We considered the importance of Climate Transient Response and socio-economic factors leading to earth system computer models and projections for future warming. Mitigation and adaption strategies outlined in the reports rely heavily on Bio Energy and Carbon Capture and Storage.

Carbon Capture is one of the features of a new type of natural gas-based turbine electricity generation based on the Allam Cycle. A demonstration 50 mW system came online in Texas, USA last year and there is a proposal for a future 300 mW plant in New Zealand.

The system relies on burning natural gas with pure oxygen at high pressure in a combustor, producing super critical CO2 feeding into a conventional type of turbine at 300 bar pressure and 1150 degrees C temperature. The output of the turbine is completely recovered and most of it is 'recuperated' and fed back into the oxygen and natural gas mixture in the combustor. Only a relatively small amount of CO2 is not reused, but it is fully captured and there are no emissions of gas to the atmosphere. Water is also an output.
